Vessel Gallery presents *Half-Life* a solo exhibition by glass artist Elliot Walker. Tackling themes such as abandonment, radiation and environmental catastrophe, Walker will be challenging our ideas and perceptions of the world around us.

Unashamedly apocalyptic, *Half-life* is an exploration of the 'post event', the uninhabited world as a result of what not only could happen but what may also be left behind.

Though not didactic in nature, Walker's art works will be investigating his fear and distrust of nuclear power and its imagined disastrous consequences, something he views as the epitome of our inexorable modernisation.

What will be the repercussions on having opened Pandora's box? On our food, our environment and our genetic future?

In the artist's own words:

"The vitrification of materials is a common occurrence at sites of great calamity, and this transformation of organic material into something 'other' has informed the creation of these pieces. I am also interested in the preservative nature of this sudden change of state, such as the premature fossilisation of Pompeii or the encapsulation of lifeforms in tree sap, there is a fascinating beauty in disaster"

## Elliot Walker b: 1988, Wolverhampton, United Kningdom

Elliot Walker is one of the UK's finest rising glass stars and in his relatively short glass blowing career, has already become one of the most active and inspiring artists of his generation. A genuinely rare talent, Walker combines an aesthetic sensitivity with exceptional skills that follow a novelist's ability for storytelling. As one of a handful of glassblowers in the world who focus solely on a technique called *Massello*, it takes extreme dexterity, speed and precise temperature control to sculpt and master the molten glass.

"The process of coaxing a complex form out of the liquid glass is unlike working with any other material. The pieces are not cast, carved or ground into shape, but modelled from a cooling liquid so that until the very last second the sculpture is a moving living entity, frozen in time as the glass sets" Elliot Walker

Having gained a Masters Degree in Applied Arts from Wolverhampton University and awarded the Frederic Stuart Memorial Fund by the Worshipful Company of Glass Sellers, there seems to be no stopping Walker. He has exhibited extensively within the UK with his work represented within the Broadfield House Museum collections. He truly is a leading light for British Studio Glass.
